UPON hearing the counsel the Court made the following ORDER

Learned counsel for the petitioner seeks permission to withdraw IA Nos.2&3 of 2015 in Writ Petition(Civil) No.295 of 2012.

Permission granted.

IA Nos.2&3 of 2015 are dismissed as withdrawn.

We have heard learned counsel for the parties.

Keeping in mind that the number of deaths due to road accidents is said to be over 1,00,000 per year and the amount of compensation awarded by the insurance companies runs into hundreds of crores of rupees every year, the Committee has done some exemplary work and recommendations which need to be seriously discussed and debated.

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In fact, some of the recommendations made by the conveyed to the Committee were Transport Commissioner/Secretary of the Transport Department of all the States and Union Territories by a letter dated 23 rd December, 2014.

Learned amicus curiae informs us that only a few of the States have responded to the proposed measures, but it is not clear whether these measures

have been

implemented or not.

Under these circumstances, keeping in mind the safety of people on the roads and the financial cost involved in not taking the matter with due earnestness, we direct the Secretary in the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways, Government of India to call a meeting of his counterparts in all the States and Union Territories within a period of six weeks from today, i.e., on or before 31 st May, 2015 deliberate and to on the reports prepared by the Committee as well as the recommendations made by the Committee and to discuss threadbare the issues raised by the Committee from time to time, means of implementation and further measures that can be taken.

The minutes of the deliberations of the meeting to be convened by the Secretary will be placed on the record of this Court and will also be handed over to the Committee well before the deadline proposed by the Committee, i.e., 30th June, 2015.

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We have been informed by learned amicus curiae that given the importance and significance of the task involved, the facilities that have been made available to the Committee are extremely inadequate.

As mentioned above, we have been informed that more than 1,00,000 people suffer death due to road accidents the claims that are settled the every year and by insurance companies for these deaths run into hundreds of crores of rupees every year and in any case, very large and enormous sums. Under these circumstances, we fail to understand why the Central Government is unable provide adequate facilities to the Committee, which is doing exemplary work and if the recommendations of the Committee are implemented in letter and spirit, not only will the number of deaths be brought down drastically but the compensation payable by the insurance companies will

also reduce by several crores of rupees.

Learned counsel for the Union of India says that she
will take up the matter seriously with the concerned
Ministry particularly keeping in mind the letter sent by
the learned Attorney General on 19th December, 2014 to the
Revenue Secretary and the Urban Development Secretary.

List the matter on 24th April, 2015 to await a response from the Union of India.
